Our State Auxiliary President not too long ago, stood in the doorway of a meeting room, witnessing an exchange that deeply troubled her. A comrade and an Auxiliary member were engaged in a heated argument, exchanging unkind words with one another. Each of, after the confrontation, came to her separately to explain their side. The comrade spoke of defending his family, expressing his frustration and need to protect his loved ones. Fire Prevention Month 2024

October is Fire Prevention Month! The goal of Fire Prevention Month is to raise fire safety awareness and help protect homes and families. In 1922, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) named the second week of October Fire Prevention Week in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. We celebrate Fire Prevention Week and Month by spreading fire safety awareness and educating families, students and communities across the United States with help from our partners and local fire departments. Enjoy the moments and memories you create with your loved ones with peace of mind knowing you're protected.

Did You Know?

Installing reliable protection and being proactive is important to help keep your loved ones safe from a fire or carbon monoxide (CO) emergency.

- Almost three of every five home fire deaths resulted from fires with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms (NFPA)
- Carbon monoxide is the #1 cause of accidental poisoning in the US (CDC)
- Unattended cooking is the #1 cause of home fires (NFPA)
- A fire department responds to a fire every 23 seconds in America (NFPA)

Help Protect Life's Moments

We urge you to practice whole home safety, so you and your family are prepared not only during Fire Prevention Month but throughout the entire year. Having functioning smoke and carbon monoxide detectors installed throughout your home is a vital piece of fire safety month and is the first line of defense. They work around the clock to provide your family with an early alert in the event of an emergency, helping to give you time to safely escape. Smoke and CO alarms should be installed on every level of the home, including the basement, as well as inside and outside each bedroom for whole home protection. Maintain alarms by testing them regularly, changing the batteries every six months and replacing alarms at least every 10 years.

Also be prepared with fire extinguishers. Fire extinguishers help stop small fires from causing more damage and should be kept easily accessible on every level of the home, especially in the kitchen and garage. Ensure you know how to operate a fire extinguisher before needing to use one. In case you don't here is how to use one:

P.A.S.S. the Fire Extinguisher

Using a fire extinguisher during an emergency can be intimidating, especially if you do not know the proper way to use one. Luckily, there is a useful acronym to help you remember the four easy steps when using a fire extinguisher in the event of an emergency.

Pull:

Pull the pin. There is a small pin that prevents the fire extinguisher from accidentally being discharged, all you have to do is pull it out and continue on to the next step.

Aim:

Aim the nozzle of the fire extinguisher low at the base of the fire.

Squeeze:

Squeeze the trigger you just pulled the pin out of. Remember to squeeze it slowly and evenly, so the extinguisher is as effective as possible.

Sweep:

Sweep the extinguisher from side to side to cover all areas the fire may have spread.

Additional Safety Precautions

Before operating a fire extinguisher, you must take some safety precautions. First, assess the fire; if it is too big or uncontrollable, don't risk your safety by trying to put it out, evacuate the house and call 9-1-1 immediately. If the fire is small enough and can easily extinguished, continue to use the P.A.S.S. fire extinguisher technique. Make sure to hold the fire extinguisher with the nozzle pointing AWAY from you and keep your back towards a clear exit so you can safely exit if the fire becomes too dangerous.

Fire extinguishers should be stored on every level of the home and in areas like the kitchen and garage. Store them in accessible places or mount the extinguishers on the wall for easy access in the event of an emergency.

The suicide prevention program is up and running here in Pennsylvania. We are trying to raise between \$25k - \$30k before the spring to coordinate the first ever Pennsylvania VFW Mental Wellness Weekend for Veteran Families from around the State! Please forward donations to State Headquarters earmarked for Mental Wellness so our Quartermaster can allocate the donations and funds!

The last month was a busy one for suicide prevention. Veterans from around the country converged on New York City for an Irreverent Warriors Hike that took us from Washington Square Park to the 9/11 Memorial, and back up to Times Square. If you're wondering how this makes a difference, we came

upon a woman on a park bench who asked what we were doing for the day, just to find out she was an 8-Year Army Veteran homeless and living out of a shelter for the last four months. Within 24 hours we had an attorney for her and put her in touch with the Veteran Service Officers in New York and she is getting the help she needs so desperately. No One Does More For Veterans has a new meaning for her!

VETERAN'S SERVICE

Thanks to our amazing legislative team, both at the National and at the State level, our laws are changing rapidly for the benefit of our Veterans and their families. Every Veteran deserves to be medically or monetarily taken care of for their injuries or ailments that were caused by serving their country. If you have an in-service event, illness or injury and a current diagnosis, an accredited service officer or claim consultant can help you connect it to your service. Several pieces of legislation such as the PACT Act have made it easier to file and get it to connect. There are so many disabilities that the VA has said are

presumptive, meaning they were caused by service in Vietnam and Southwest Asia, which are the two most common. If you don't fall into those two locations, please ask an Accredited Service Officer or Claims Consultant and they can advise you. There are so many locations, and more are frequently added. Also, earlier this year, President Biden signed the toxic exposure bill where all Veterans who were exposed to toxins and other hazards while serving in the military – at home or abroad – are now eligible to enroll directly in VA health care. Additionally, Veterans who never deployed but were exposed to toxins or hazards while training or on active duty in the United States are eligible to enroll. Your Accredited Service Officer and Claims Consultant can help you enroll in health care as well. If you are unsure, please reach out. Attached is our Service Officer and Claims Consultant contact information.

COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORTING WEBSITE INSTRUCTIONS

The Department is changing the way we are doing the reporting. It will all be done through the www.vfwpa.org website. Follow the instructions below:

- 1. Click the hyperlink www.vfwpa.org this will take you to our website
- 2. On the right side you will see login, click on the drop-down box and choose Members Only and this will take you to the login
- 3. Member ID: Your VFW member number

Password: Your last name (all lower case)

- 4. This will take you to 2 options: Dashboard or Program Reports
- 5. Click on Program Reports
- 6. Here you will see your Post and District with your email address of the submitter
 - a. Put in the date of activity
 - b. Select the program you are applying it to and a list of select activities will come up and choose which activity your information applies to
 - c. Then it will go to Hours; Miles, Members and Dollars Spent/Donated, add the information and then you can add a description
- 7. Click Submit and your Community Service Report will go directly to the Department for John Getz to approve it. Once approved it goes directly to National. Allow 24 Hours to update through National.

No one does more for veterans is the Veterans of Foreign Wars' motto. The statement is so true for Mountain Laurel Post 8612 earlier this month.

A few years ago, John E. Conroy, a Marine Corps Veteran who lived in Pike County, PA, lost his home and everything the family owned in a fire. John was severely burned in the fire and had spent the last two years in and out of the hospital for the wounds that he suffered. His family never recovered from the loss of their house. John sadly passed away on July 1st, 2024. With the family not having any money, a local funeral home went to New York to pick up the body at no cost to the family. Our Jr. Vice Commander Tim Benton heard about what was happening and contacted the funeral home. The funeral director said that John's wish was to be buried in a Veteran's Cemetery and be close to his family.

Mountain Laurel Post 8612 has members who sit on the board of a local private veteran's cemetery. Together, the Post Officers decided that the Post would pay for his plot using our poppy funds. The board members paid to dig the grave, and the cemetery owners provided the footing for the headstone.

It did not cost John's family anything for his funeral, and he was given a graveside service with full military honors. Although not a member of the VFW nor any other Veterans Service Organization, John had his final wish come true for his family.

Mountain Laurel Post 8612 was honored to help this family and the Veteran on this occasion.

On August 2, 2024, members of the Honor Guard, Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), Post #23, located in Lebanon, PA, as well as the Honor Guard's civilian volunteer armorer, received Pennsylvania Meritorious Service Medals or the PA Veterans Service Awards for their faithful and dedicated service in providing military funeral honors to veterans. Brigadier General (PA) Maureen Weigl, Deputy Adjutant General for Veterans Affairs, presented the awards at the Indiantown Gap National Cemetery.

In 2023, the 10 volunteer members performed 448 funeral military honors at the Indiantown Gap National Cemetery and at local private cemeteries. In addition, the Honor Guard conducted special details and Color Guard duties at nine events, including the Lebanon Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony, Lebanon's Veterans Day Ceremony, and Indiantown Gap National Cemetery's Memorial and Veterans Day Ceremony. These events equated to approximately 3,630 volunteer hours.

The Honor Guard volunteered their services to the Indiantown Gap National Cemetery since the cemetery's inception in 1982. Initially, the Honor Guard served full time, but now performs funeral details every third week, sharing the duty with the Marine Corps League Honor Guard and Vet 21 Honor Guard. Several of our Honor Guard members served at well over 15,000 funerals. The oldest member of the Honor Guard is 92 years old and the youngest is 56 years old, making the average age of most of the members in the high 70s. The number of funerals details the Honor Guard may conduct each day varies from as few as one to the maximum of 12.

The VFW, Post #23 is the third oldest VFW post in Pennsylvania and the ninth oldest in the Nation. The Honor Guard was established in 1921 and currently consists of veterans of every war, conflict, and operation from Korea to Iraqi Freedom; Army, Navy, Air Force; male and female. When the Honor Guard conducts a funeral detail, the duties include a rifle volley, the sounding of Taps and, if conducted at a private cemetery, the folding and presentation of the US flag. The Honor Guard uses World War II and Korean era ceremonial Springfield M1 Garand rifles provided by the US Army's TACOM Life Cycle Management Command's Ceremonial Rifle program and ammunition, which is supplied through the US Army Joint Munitions Command, Rock Island Arsenal, IL. Uniforms and accoutrements are purchased with donations received from the families of those for whom the Honor Guard provided final honors and grant money received from the State. Honor Guard members wear a variation of their branch service uniform, thereby providing a greater representation of the Armed Forces while rendering final honors.

We are loath to ever decline a request to provide final honors to a veteran, but the volume of requests prohibits coverage for all funerals. If there is any veteran in the community who would relish the privilege and honor that comes with bestowing the final honors to a fallen service member, please contact the VFW Post #23 at (717) 273-0331. The appreciation seen on the faces of the veteran's family is truly worthwhile!

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PENNSYLVANIA'S 28TH DIVISION COMMEMORATES 80TH ANNIVERSARIES

The Pennsylvania Army National Guard's 28th Infantry Division is commemorating many of its achievements from 80 years ago to include the Liberation of Paris, but most significantly its fighting in the Battle of the Bulge, the last major offensive of the German Army in WW II.

"The 28th... held the longest front in the Ardennes on the day of attack; had the least corps support... was attacked by seven German divisions, which was twice as many as any other division on the front; suffered more dead and wounded in the Bulge than any other division; and inflicted more dead and wounded casualties on the Germans than any other division," according to Raymond Carpenter, past historian of the Society of the 28th Division.

Pennsylvania author and historian Walter S. Zapotoczny Jr. will be chairing conferences on the Battle of the Bulge and participating in ceremonies across Luxembourg as they honor the sacrifices of American soldiers.

"The 28th Infantry Division played a significant role in delaying the German advance at the start of the Battle of the Bulge," said Zapotoczny. "Pennsylvanians can be proud that their National Guard helped to save lives and shorten World War II."

Zapotoczny's book, 28th Infantry Division in the Battle of the Bulge, is being released in November prior to the 80th Anniversary of the battle on Dec. 16.

The book examines the exceptional heroism of the 28th Infantry Division in the Battle of the Bulge and the motivating factors that contributed to the actions of their brave soldiers.

PENNSYLVANIA VFW TAKES NATIONAL STAGE

Pennsylvania Veterans of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary arrived on the national stage after being elected as national officers at the 125th VFW National Convention July 27-Aug. 1 in Louisville, Kentucky.

The Rev. Peter Hook serves as the VFW National Chaplain, Donna Mills is the National Junior Vice President of the VFW Auxiliary and Glenn Umberger is the designee for National Jr-Vice Commander-in-Chief (CIC) and should be installed next year.

"Congratulations to all," said Past National VFW Commander 2020-21 Hal Roesch, who is from Hampton, Virginia but was born in Renovo, Pa. "I would remind them that they have been chosen to lead their organization and they need to be relevant, mentor, focus on the mission, do media interviews, visit the military installations and be vocal about what's important for veterans."

Roesch said Pennsylvania is the second largest department in the VFW and the largest in the Eastern Conference. The last CIC was John Biedrzycki in 2015-16 and the one before that was Joseph L. Vicites in 1971-72.

"It's a pretty big deal for Pennsylvania to have another VFW Commander-in-Chief," said Roesch.

"Serving in leadership roles on the national stage speaks volumes for the type of men and women from Pennsylvania who have also served our nation in uniform," Brig. Gen. (PA) Maureen Weigl, deputy adjutant general of Veterans Affairs, Department of Military and Veterans Affairs. "I am proud to see that we are represented nationally to help improve the lives of those across our nation who served and sacrificed."

"The VFW unofficially breaks the country up into four conferences, the Eastern, Southern, Big Ten, and Western," said Roesch, explaining the election process. "There is a rotation between the conferences to elect their designee for the national Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief."

Roesch said each conference gets to designate every four years and the designee is almost always elected by the membership of the VFW for the position of Jr-vice Commander-in-Chief.

"Once elected as Junior they pretty much continue the progression to Senior Vice and then commander unopposed," said Roesch. "It usually takes a lot of time and effort at the post, district, department (state) level for the conference to give the person their endorsement and backing."
