It features a scrolling carousel of artwork for each branch. He also said it can generate an e-newsletter that you can sign up for on the site.

Angell said that the national HQs would like to see more and more VFW organizations move to the new site. "I learn more and more about what you can do but it can be as simple or as complex as a user wants," said Angell. "We all still have a lot of work to do so I ask for everyone's patience."





Cpl. Claire Van Eman Grove City VFW Post 519 100th Anniversary Celebration

On Saturday, October 3, 2020, the Cpl. Claire Van Eman Grove City VFW Post 519 celebrated their 100th anniversary. The Post was established on October 6, 1920 in memory of Cpl. Clare Van Eman of Grove City, PA, who had given his life in service to our country during World War I. Cpl. Van Eman was a soldier in the 5th Marine Regiment, 2nd Division. He was killed in action on June 6, 1918, at the

Battle of Belleau Wood. The Battle of Belleau Wood is a historical battle in Marine lore. He is buried in the Aisne-Marne Cemetery in France with his fallen comrades.



The celebration also included the presentation of custom 100th Anniversary coins to those in attendance. The coins were distributed by Commander Ben Lewis, and Senior Vice President, Milan Mijatov. The Post's oldest living member, Dallas Schull, a World War II veteran, was in attendance, and was the first to be presented with his coin by Commander Lewis. After the closing of the Anniversary Celebration, all in attendance enjoyed a catered meal from Family Traditions.



Both the Cpl. Claire Van Eman Grove City VFW Post 519 and the Post 519 Auxiliary are very active in the Grove City community. VFW Post 845 Supports Fresh Start By Ernie Griffith



As the 2020 Christmas season approached, due to Corona virus restrictions on church gatherings, one Downingtown area church has been unable to offer the same charitable support it had given to the Fresh Start Foundation in previous years. Consequently, Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 845 of Downingtown was asked if it could help make the

holiday season a little brighter for approximately 60 homeless veterans.

Post 845 willingly agreed to help because as Post Commander Marty Peterson has stated many times, "The primary purpose of the post is to help other veterans."

The Fresh Start Foundation is one arm of a non-profit organization, Merakey. That organization's purpose is to provide social services to a wide variety of people in twelve states. The subsidiary, Fresh Start, assists chemically dependent, mentally ill, and/ or homeless individuals in gaining the treatment and support necessary to lead a healthy and productive life. The Coatesville Fresh Start operation focuses on homeless individuals and in particular homeless veterans.

Jennifer Ficco is program manager for a Fresh Start operation on the campus of the Coatesville Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital. She explained that her organization houses homeless male veterans in two separate buildings, where she works to prepare them to acquire housing elsewhere when they are physically and mentally able to do so. While other doctors and counselors help with addiction, mental health, or other physical problems, Ficco focuses on finding affordable housing for the veterans.

Until adequate housing

can be found, the veterans are housed and fed on VA grounds.

To make life a little more pleasant for the veterans, Ficco plans an annual holiday event whereby the men enjoy a meal with some upgrades such as pie for dessert or a specialty sandwich tray. The men are also presented with a gift bag on Christmas day containing personal use items such as socks, toothpaste, and packaged snack foods. The gift bags this year will be through the courtesy of Post 845.

Post Quartermaster and retired army Sgt. 1st Class, Ernie Griffith, solicited donations from members of the post and the surrounding community. Griffith said he had a very generous response. He and fellow post members packaged 60 gift bags that will be distributed on Christmas Day. The post also is donating a \$500 gift certificate to be used for groceries that will enhance the meal at the holiday party.

Striving to Recognize Valor

Arthur Liss has spent the last 10 years attempting to upgrade his brothers Distinguished Flying Cross for Valor. However, the change of politicians in office and other dead ends and roadblocks have stalled his efforts. He continues to drive toward his goal because he honestly believes

the military would have rated him a higher award if they knew all the facts at the time.

"I approached the participants and suggested that I be the repository for communications to remove any other participants from feeling that they were being self-served, said Art Liss. "Larry's former commander Gen. Weyand wrote a letter in 2008. It was a look back on the facts for and a recommendation for the silver star. That should've happened in 2009."

That letter never went through.

Former congressmen Joe Sestak saw the documentary on Larry Liss and his actions under fire in Vietnam and he then recommended the Medal of Honor.

"There were multiple issues at play during the time that the award write-up took place," said Art Liss. "We can talk more about the idea of struggling with the Army Awards Branch given how many cases they are behind. It was not too much to ask to re-open the door and look at the considerations being presented to them. They should not give up on a case and continually ask for new evidence not recognizing they have all the evidence they need."

Art's brother, Larry Liss, certainly defied the odds to save others. It can be seen in the documentary, "Helicopter Wars-Vietnam Firefight."

According to the website Larryliss.com, a company of over 100 men led by U.S. Special Forces was ambushed. They were surrounded and outnumbered six to one. They were sure

to be annihilated unless they were extracted. Two helicopters answered the desperate call for help.

When they arrive, there is nowhere to land amid the thick 40-foot-high bamboo. They decide their only option is to chop their own landing zone using their helicopters' rotor blades. To rescue all the men, they will have to return five times. Each time they go back there are less troops on the ground to defend the landing zone.

The fire was intense and Larry had to even dismount the helicopter at times to aid the wounded on-board.

Larry's helicopter was totally unarmed. In the back of the other helicopter is a single machine gun. It was amazing that the blades could take the damage that they took.

"This is not about me but seeking the truth and presenting the Proper Honors owed by this Nation to all the heroes of this Mission," said Art Liss. "Right now, Capt. Liss is the main nominee to open the doors for further upgrades as deemed necessary by General Weyand. It is time that people hear the words of those who were there on 14 May 1967."

The EC-130J Commando Solo, a specially-modified four-engine Hercules transport, conducts Military Information Support Operations and civil affairs broadcasts in FM, TV and military communications bands. The Wing has expanded its mission sets in recent years to include clandestine, low-visibility, low-level resupply and infiltration/exfiltration.

Mestrovich and the Medal of Honor

Today's news cycle reports daily on the actions of Army National Guard soldiers performing pandemic response around the country. The Guard and its members have long supported health crises around the world, ensuring military doctors and aid can help those in need. One of the most famous men in the 28th Infantry Division began his career in the Army National Guard due to his experience in pandemic response.

In 1914, Serbia and the Balkan Region were facing a pandemic of their own. Typhus had swept through the Serbian Military on campaign, and in turn spread rapidly through the civilian populace. Back in the United States, growing concern about the fate of the Serbian people led aid organizations to begin deploying to the region. A group of volunteer doctors and nurses assembled in the US through the Red Cross to provide critical medical personnel to Serbia. They quickly realized that despite their medical skills, none of them spoke the language. A California surgeon recommended a man he had worked with in Fresno, now Pittsburghbased bookkeeper and auditor. James Mestrovich was an emigre from Serbia who had come to the United States with his uncle

and brother to California in search of work. He joined the delegation and spent 15 months in Serbia on the front lines of the pandemic. While there, Mestrovich witnessed Typhus outbreak and the horrors of the World War. In addition to his linguist duties, he assisted his fellow countryman who had been wounded

on the battlefield. Mestrovich once aided a Serbian Captain and famous Belgrade Professor, who would visit him back in Pittsburgh, while the Captain recuperated there in 1917. American members of the Red Cross did all they could for the Serbian people and in the process, the majority of the group was infected with a third of the American Surgeons and many of the nurses in the group giving their life in an effort to serve the Serbian people.

Mestrovich returned to his newfound homeland after the mission with a great patriotism. He told a reporter: "Before I went back home with American Doctors and saw the loyalty with which they served humanity," said Cpl. Mestrovich. "did I (sic) understand the meaning of Americanism." Upon returning to Pittsburgh in 1916, Mestrovich marched to his local recruiter and joined Company C, 18th Infantry,

Pennsylvania National Guard. "After the Americans did this for my people, maybe you can understand why I am in the National Guard. I left a good job as a bookkeeper at a hotel in Pittsburgh to serve my country's savior. I am ready for any service the United States has for me."

Mestrovich was ready. In June of 1916, he was mobilized with the unit to the Mexican Border and promoted to Corporal after showing his military experience gained with the Serbian Army. Mestrovich's service would not stop there. When the Company was mobilized for WWI, it became Company C of the 111th Infantry, today part of the 56th Stryker Brigade. Fighting in France as a Sergeant Mestrovich forever cemented his name in history. During the battle for Fismette along the Vesle River in August of 1918, Sgt. Mestrovich saw his Company Commander wounded as the Company fell back from the ruins of the city. Without regard for his own safety, Mestrovich charged forward through a hail of machine gun fire and falling artillery to rescue his Captain, returning to safety to provide life saving first aid. For this action he would become the 28th Division's first Congressional Medal of Honor recipient.

Sadly, Mestrovich did not survive the war. As the fighting raged in the Meuse Argonne, Sgt. James Mestrovich fell in action on Nov. 4, 1918, only a week from the end of the war. Sgt. James Mestrovich was returned to his mother in 1925 in Boka, now part of Montenegro. In 1925, the U.S. mission to the City of Split located Mestrovich's mother and presented her with his Congressional Medal of Honor in the presence of an honor guard. Mestrovich, who had been inspired by American doctors who traveled to his homeland to provide aid, joined the National Guard to serve his adopted country. In its moment of need, he courageously gave his life in the pursuit of American ideals. Though buried in his homeland of Montenegro, his spirit and patriotism live on in the halls of the 111th Infantry and the Pennsylvania Army National Guard.

As we approach the end of the Auxiliary program year, I want to thank everyone for their hard work, I know this year has been a difficult year for all because of COVID-19.


I want to remind everyone that it is time to complete your year-end reports. The reporting period is April 1, 2020 through March 31, 2021.
